

John Lyttleton Tazewell Holland July 5, 1833-March 5, 1896

Who was John Lyttleton Tazewell Holland? He was the father of Bernard Peabody Holland, the builder of our beloved deWitt Cottage. But he was way more than just his father. He was also a **double descendant** of Gabriel Holland, who immigrated to the new world on the British Ship "Supply" in 1621. John was the 4th great grandson of Gabriel on his mother's side and the 5th great grandson on his father's side of the Family.

Gabriel Holland arrived in the new world on January 29, 1621 as an "Indentured Servant" to the London Company with his older brother Richard. They were assigned to establish the Berkeley 100 Plantation on the North side of the James River about 12 miles Northwest of the Jamestown Colony. On March 22, 1622, Richard Holland was killed by Indians in the "Berkeley Massacre". Gabriel Holland survived the attack to go on to be a member of the Virginia House of Burgesses. He would have several children with his first wife Rebecca George and then with his second wife Mary Pink leaving many descendants in Virginia.

John was a circuit riding preacher and married Emma Walton. They lived on the Walton Family Plantation, "Osceola", located in Fluvanna County

outside of Richmond, with Emma's Parents. Bernard was born March 13, 1867. Shortly after Bernard's birth the Walton's lost the family plantation to "Carpetbaggers" for unpaid taxes on the plantation property. This forced the Hollands to move into much more humbling accommodations in Amelia County, Virginia. Bernard was the first of seven children to be born to John and Emma Holland. The children were all home schooled by their parents. In 1885, Bernard and his brother Walton moved to Princess Anne County in search of their fortune.

John became the permanent pastor at Jetersville Christian Church located in Amelia County in 1874. He remained the pastor there until his death. Near the end of 1895 while he was shoeing a mule; the mule kicked John in the head. John fell into a comma that lasted for five months until his death. He was buried in the Jetersville Christian Church Cementary.



Edward "Ned" Burgess (10/16/1868 - 10/13/1958) was born in Duck, NC and raised in Currituck County



NC. Ned was a prolific decoy carver and carved more decoys in his lifetime than anyone in North Carolina. Ned was orphaned at a young age and became a sailor at the young age of nine years old. He began carving decoys on the long voyages to pass the time. He later became a hunter trapper and fisherman.

Ned was a man of modest means who used simple tools to carve his decoys including a hatchet and a rasp. His style remained constant throughout his years of carving into his 80s. My Ned burgess ruddy duck pictured is approximately 8 inches long with a squared off tail and dark brown paint with white cheek patches and a gray bill.

A Very Special Bank Account.

Imagine you had a bank account that deposited \$86,400 each morning.
