

Captain Wayland Baum (1904-2007)made this juniper brant decoy. He was a commercial fisherman, hunting guide and decoy maker from the Roanoke Island community of Wanchese, NC. His brant decoys are highly collectible due to their relative scarcity and folky appeal. The bodies are long and slender. The heads are upright and undersized for the bodies. Wayland operated four sink boxes in the Pamlico Sound/Oregon Inlet area until they were outlawed in the 1930s. During the 1940s and 50s, he was an active fishing and hunting guide.

It was not until he was 82 that he stopped fishing commercially. Wayland lived until the ripe age of 103, and he is admired for his endurance as well as his stylish decoys.

We had a wonderful group of 65 members and we gave away some very nice prizes. It was also the night for our Fall Raffle Drawing. We drew 7 tickets and gave away two beautiful 12 gauge shotguns, 4 beautiful contemporary decoy carvings and a pair of Canvasback decoy slicks. I would be remiss if I did not acknowledge the individuals who so graciously donated the guns and decoys. David Forkner of Maryville, Tennessee donated the grand prize a Beretta Lioness limited edition 12 gauge shotgun. Wayne Jarman, our current Vice-President donated a Remington 11-87 12 gauge shotgun. Al Brandtner donated four of the five decoy prizes that were given away. The raffle raised a little over \$10,000. Thanks to everyone who purchased tickets, we are very appreciative of your support!

MARINADED DUCK BREAST

½ cup soy or teriyaki sauce

1 Tablespoon apple cider vinegar

1 Tablespoon Traditional balsamic vinegar

4 duck breast skinned (cleaned and rinsed)

½ cup olive oil

1 Tablespoon grated fresh ginger

1 Tablespoon crushed, chopped fresh garlic

(Mix wet ingredients)

Place duck breast in zip lock bag, pour in wet ingredients and seal

Marinade for one hour at room temperature, mixing duck breast 3-4 times

Prepare grill with charcoal, when coals are glowing red hot, place duck breast on oiled grates

Sear for 1-2 minutes, turn sear another 1-2 minutes or until duck breast is pink inside.

Do not overcook, duck breast is best when cooked rare.

Old Fashion Coconut Pie

3 tsp. flour 2-9 inch pie shells (deep dish)

5 eggs nutmeg

2 ½ cup Angel Flake coconut

Heat milk and butter together. Mix sugar, flour, eggs and salt together with milk and butter, adding coconut last. Pour into unbaked pie shells and bake 375 until set. When done remove from oven and sprinkle top with small amount of nutmeg.
