Cornelia Randall Holland June 5, 1898 – February 12, 1988

Cornelia Holland (aka "Nini") was the only daughter of Bernard P. Holland, Sr. and Emily Holland. She was the 4th Holland child to be born in the "Holland Cottage" (aka "The Brickhouse").

Nini was 11 years old when the Hollands moved into their new home at "Ozone". Shortly after they moved John L. Holland was born in the new house. Immediately Nini took responsibility for looking after and supervising John.

Emily opened "The Variety Shop" (a yard goods shop) in the B. P. Holland Store on 17th Street in Virginia Beach. This presented opportunity for Nini to learn how to sew and knit. She became an expert knitter and seamstress. These skills allowed her to take in jobs at "Ozone" while she cared for her younger brother. Because Emily was at the "shop" nearly every day working, someone had to pay the price for taking care of the rest of the family. Unfortunately that person was Nini. With the help of an African American woman, Virginia Snead, Nini took care of the household chores, sewed and knitted for her mother's customers, and became a wonderful cook. It was not unusual for the eldest daughter in a family during this time to assume many of the house hold chores; but, it was especially difficult for Nini.

Nini was very much in love with a young man and wanted to marry him. Her parents had forbidden the marriage and they convinced her to forget the young man with a trip to Europe and a promise to inherit "Ozone" Her three older brothers all attended the University of Virginia and Nini resented the fact that she was not as well educated as her brothers.














COLLECTOR'S SHELF William D. "Will" Kight Jr. Coot Decoy

Will Kight Jr. (1897-1977) born in Creeds, VA was a farmer, waterman and a hunting guide at the Corey Lodge, Knotts Island. The lodge was owned by William Corey President of US Steel. Built in 1924 and



destroyed by fire in1940. Will also traveled and worked as a coastal surveyor and played semi-pro baseball in Virginia in the 1920's. He was a meticulous decoy carver and made decoys from various kinds of materials including juniper, balsa, cypress and cork.

Coots also known as "mud hens" or blue petes are members of the rail family. Coots are plentiful, swim in open waters and the decoys are often used by hunters as confidence decoys. I recently purchased a rig of decoys that were used in Back Bay that contained some of Will Kight's coots. The coot is made from cork and a 1 inch. Juniper bottom board. It has a wooden flat sided head with a wooden dowel attaching it to the body.


Let me introduce the four (4) individuals up for election, (3) new BoD members and one (1) re-election that make up your current slate of officers who have offered to serve:


FROM THE MUSEUM DIRECTOR
